Gentlemen.

It is our blessed privilege to serve our beloved society during the Fall Convention and at a recent meeting, we have already gone over the proposed entertainment and volunteers have come forward for various responsible positions.

We shall list all the entertainment features in order, together with the members of the Committee responsible for various parts as follows:

- 1. November 15 and 16, two (2) free Sazeracs with each registration. At registration time, each registrant will be given tickets good for two (2) free Sazeracs at the special bar set up near the registration room. Registration is in charge of Neal Smith with The California Company and Neal Smith and Watson will give a general supervision to the Sazeracs distributed by the bar and take up any questions to be raised with the hotel concerning this.
- Thursday, November 15 Walking Tour of the Vieux Carre for the Ladies, Time, 1:45 p.m. - 4:30 p.m. with the ladies assembling in the Mezzanine of the Roosevelt to begin the walking tour.

Burton has volunteered to be in charge of the Walking Tour and will be responsible for obtaining the buses in the event of rain at 1:45, and also check to see that 4 buses will be waiting at the Cabildo at 4:30 p.m. to return the entourage to the Roosevelt. The person to call with regard to the buses is a Miss Durel with the Public Service and she is aware of the arrangements and I have given her Gerry Burton's name also.

I have asked Crouere and McKee to assist Burton in shooing the ladies into the buses at the Roosevelt or getting them started down the street in tow of the guides in case of fair weather.

I shall arrange with Mr. Degering for snacks, corkage, mixers, ice, etc., and the hotel will furnish the waiters and all glassware and so on, just as they did last spring,

5. Bus Tour for Ladies, 9:30 - 11:30 a.m., leaving from Roosevelt Hotel.

This bus tour has been already checked by me with the Toye Bros. tours and Slocum Harvey has again volunteered to check to make sure that the buses will be there and in sufficient quantity.

The name of the person to call is a Mr. Pohlman with Yellow Cab Bus Tours and the telephone number is RA 7933.

Mr. Pohlman told me that there would be no difficulty whatever about the proper number of buses on a short notice and I suggest that the afternoon before, we may have a good idea of how many of the ladies will attend and we can call Mr. Pohlman and let him know.

6. Cocktail Party - Men and Wives - Grand Ballroom Roosevelt - 6:30-8:00 p.

This cocktail party is to be thrown by the N.O.G.S. if again we get sufficient donations, and two Pinkerton men have been retained to assist at the doors in taking up the tickets and so forth. The only thing we have done is to make sure that the two Pinkerton men who were hired for the Cocktail Party return and serve at the door for this dance so that Baysinger and his designees will have some help with the tickets and so forth.

I personally am looking forward to seeing all the Committee and their wives at the dance and dancing with most of the wives and finally passing out cold in the grand finale.

The Committee, of course, will have another meeting or two before the events and refine the plans and make any suggestions that may occur to us, but, in general, the above gives a rough outline of the duties and responsibilities of the various members.

It is of interest to note that the hostesses for the <u>Walking Tour</u> will be the wives of the current Executive Committee, plus the wife of the Past President, in other words, Mrs. Paul Lewis, Mrs. Rockwood, Mrs. John Collier, Mrs. Ray Kelly and Mrs. Watson.

For the <u>Cocktail Party for the Ladies</u>, the hostesses will be the wives of the Entertainment Committee with Mrs. C. B. Pennington as sort of a super-hostess as the wife of the donor of the favors. In this connection, one white gardenia, tastefully arranged, will be presented to each hostess and they will be expected to be at the Petroleum Club a few minutes before six to make sure that they are ready to welcome the guests.

The hostesses, thus, for the Cocktail Party will be: Mrs. Pennington, as the hostess of honor, and our beloved wives, Mrs. Boebel, Mrs. Burton, Mrs. Crouere, Mrs. Harvey, Mrs. McKee and Mrs. Watson.

Hostesses for both Walking Tour and Cocktail Party will be identified by silken ribbons with the word H O S T E S S written vertically and N.O.G.S. at the bottom so that they can be collected and used later on if necessary. The hostesses for the Walking Tour will get blue ribbons and the hostesses for the Cocktail Party will get red ribbons. Please notify your wives so they may dress accordingly.

I believe that the above constitutes a very lengthy and unnecessarily wordy coverage of all the events and the responsibilities and duties, but we shall, as I have said before, meet again to refine our arrangements and bring up any further suggestions.
